Ep 22: Bishops in the Lords- Dick Taverne interview

0:00:05.450,0:00:09.120 (Emma Park - EP) In one way or another Bishop's have been involved in English

0:00:09.120,0:00:14.009 politics for a thousand years. At the Battle of Hastings in 1066,

0:00:14.009,0:00:18.330 Odo, Bishop of Bayeux, was in the field to support his half-brother, William the

0:00:18.330,0:00:22.500
Conquerer. According to the Bayeux
Tapestry, Odo did not actually shed blood,

0:00:22.500,0:00:27.510 but he certainly wore chain mail and wielded a mean-looking club. Since the

0:00:27.510,0:00:31.020 Middle Ages bishops have sat in Parliament as the Lords Spiritual,

0:00:31.020,0:00:35.820 responsible, apparently, for the care of the nation's souls. And since Henry VIII

0:00:35.820,0:00:39.140 the monarch has been the head of both the state and the church.

0:00:39.140,0:00:43.100 Today Anglican bishops are still required to swear an oath of allegiance to the crown.

0:00:43.110,0:00:47.550 The 26 most senior bishops and archbishops form a small contingent in

0:00:47.550,0:00:52.140 the 800 strong miscellary that is the modern House of Lords. But should the 0:00:52.140,0:00:56.560 bishops, or, for that matter, the representatives of any religion, be allowed to influence

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British lawmaking as of right?

Is their presence in the UK's upper chamber

0:01:00.960,0:01:07.780 a tolerable anachronism or has the time finally come to abolish them?

0:01:07.780,0:01:12.900 (EP) You're listening to the National Secular Society podcast, hosted by Emma Park.

0:01:12.900,0:01:16.950 Today I've travelled to Westminster to interview Dick Taverne,

0:01:16.950,0:01:21.689 Baron Taverne QC. Lord Taverne is a Liberal Democrat peer and honorary

0:01:21.689,0:01:26.340 associate of the NSS. Just before Christmas he entered a private member's

0:01:26.340,0:01:31.520 bill in the Lord's ballot that would abolish the bishops right to sit in the chamber exofficio.

0:01:31.520,0:01:36.840 The bill is due to be introduced in the Lord's on Tuesday 28th January 2020.

Dick Taverne, what are the main proposals that your bill is making?

0:01:40.820,0:01:45.720

(Dick Taverne - DT) It's a very simple one: stop the bishops being part of the legislature

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and catching up with a somewhat more modern Constitution.

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(EP) The idea that religion should have no influence on politics and the complete

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separation of church and state is a long-standing principle of secularism.

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But is Britain a secular country?

Does it have a secular Constitution?

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(DT) No it doesn't. Now the historic division between church and state at

the time the Enlightenment was an extremely important development, because,

by restricting the mix of religion and politics, it promoted a democracy and

freedom and the individual rights.

And if you look at the theocracies today

which has survived, they're all examples of autocracy, and they do deny human rights.

Now we're in the extraordinary position that in Britain we haven't

completed the separation of church and state, and we're one of only two

countries in the world which actually has clerics sitting, by right, in

part of the legislature. And the other is not a very happy example, because the

only other country which has this is Iran, not the most obvious example of democracy.

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(EP) Why do you think it's taken so long in Britain for us to move towards

separation of church and state?

(DT) Oh, because we're very slow at major

constitutional reform. And it is quite extraordinary that this is survival from

the past. It was a usage from the time when religion played a very

important part in our politics, and it's no longer true, because at the moment,

after all, we're no longer a religious country. It's a minority, a very

small minority, who regularly go to church England. In fact, the Church of

England has a place in the Constitution, but is not even representative of most

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religions now in this country. So it is an extraordinary historical anomaly.

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One can't say that it's unimportant because the bishops do have a certain influence.

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(EP) How much of a difference

do the bishops make in practice,

0:04:09.100,0:04:13.400 given that they only occupy 26 out of around 800 seats?

0:04:13.400,0:04:16.920 (DT) Well, of course they contribute to debates and they have a special right in the Lord's:

0:04:16.920,0:04:20.880 when a bishop gets up they have the right to speak, and everybody else must wait until

0:04:20.890,0:04:25.520 they finish their speeches. But it's not just

0:04:25.520,0:04:31.009 the fact that they speak in the Lords, and, mind you, a lot of the bishops make

0:04:31.009,0:04:35.539 speeches which are quite reasonable - and as a group they're on the whole rather a progressive

0:04:35.539,0:04:41.150 group too - but it's the influence behind the scenes which is so important.

0:04:41.150,0:04:49.340 Why does the government promote faith schools? - which it does - and, to my mind, the

0:04:49.340,0:04:53.509 experience of Northern Ireland is certainly one which suggests that they

0:04:53.509,0:05:02.650 promote division and disunity. The state schools are

0:05:02.650,0:05:08.830 a very important feature. They are promoted by the government, as I said, and

0:05:08.830,0:05:14.120 they are contrary, not only is it a question that they tend to be 0:05:14.120,0:05:19.699 divisive, but they're contrary to all educational principle. I mean, schools

0:05:19.699,0:05:25.129 should teach kids to think for themselves and it's extraordinary that we should

0:05:25.129,0:05:32.690 divide education into Catholic schools, and treat children as Catholic children,

0:05:32.690,0:05:39.469 as Protestant children, Muslim children, Jewish children. Can you imagine a system

0:05:39.469,0:05:43.610 whereby we treat children as Conservative children, Labour children,

Liberal Democrat children? It's an absurdity.
(EP) So you're saying that

0:05:48.250,0:05:54.880 separating children by religious ideology is no better than separating them by political ideology.

0:05:54.880,0:05:57.420 (DT) I don't see if we do one, why shouldn't we do the other?

0:05:57.420,0:06:01.380 I mean, it just makes no sense at all, that anybody would dream

0:06:01.380,0:06:05.740 of doing that as a principle of politics. (EP) Are you saying that the continued presence

0:06:05.740,0:06:10.000 of the bishops in the House of Lords has an influence on the continued existence of faith school?

0:06:10.160,0:06:12.380 (DT) Oh, very much so, very much so.

0:06:12.380,0:06:15.740 And, of course, it's not just the Church of England schools and Catholic

0:06:15.740,0:06:21.190 schools, which actually are not as dogmatic as some of the newer religions,

0:06:21.190,0:06:27.310 but it's also Muslim schools now, and of course Jewish schools have rather

0:06:27.310,0:06:34.339 declined in number, but it's spreading a divisive influence in

0:06:34.339,0:06:38.889 education. The influences of the church is

0:06:38.889,0:06:42.729 really quite interesting. There was one time in the House of Lords, some years

0:06:42.729,0:06:48.370 ago, when we debated the future of Thought for the Day. Not all of us

0:06:48.370,0:06:53.169 think Thought for the Day is a very good interruption. And one of the speakers

0:06:53.169,0:06:58.569 was a former director-general, John Birt, who said that one of his first

0:06:58.569,0:07:03.189 prioritiesrwhen he became director-general of the BBC, was to abolish Thought for

0:07:03.189,0:07:09.250 the Day, because here was this splendid, most popular current affairs program in

0:07:09.250,0:07:13.900 the mornings, at peak times, very large listening audience, generally

0:07:13.900,0:07:17.979 admired as a very good program, and it's interrupted for five minutes by 0:07:17.979,0:07:23.080 something which not always promotes great sense of logic. And he was taken

0:07:23.080,0:07:28.659 aside and somebody said to him "Look, if you want to achieve any reforms in the

BBC, do not take on the Church of England".
Behind the scenes, the Church of

0:07:35.169,0:07:39.810 England still has a lot - and when I introduce my bill there be outcries of

0:07:39.810,0:07:45.789 horror almost in the Lord's because the Lord's don't like interference with the

0:07:45.789,0:07:50.589 traditional rights of bishops to sit there. (EP) You've said that that the bishops

0:07:50.589,0:07:56.259 on the whole may vote progressively, do they in general vote to protect their

0:07:56.259,0:08:03.969 own interests, as well, would you say? (DT) Yes, certainly. If religious issues

0:08:03.969,0:08:09.849 come up they speak, and they speak for themselves, but I think that that is

0:08:09.849,0:08:15.189 less important than the influence they have on education and on our

0:08:15.189,0:08:22.060 Constitution, because I don't think our Constitution gains by being the only one,

0:08:22.060,0:08:30.490 like Iran, which has an automatic place for clerics. If this bill were to go

0:08:30.490,0:08:34.990 through, the chances perhaps are not great, but if this bill were to go

0:08:34.990,0:08:40.510 through, then it would serve several purposes: Firstly, it will reduce the Church of

0:08:40.510,0:08:44.210 England's influence at the heart of government, as it were,

0:08:44.210,0:08:49.040 not a great influence, but a very important influence. It would also be a more

0:08:49.040,0:08:53.870 democratic, to remove one of the undemocratic features of the Lords,

0:08:53.870,0:08:59.090 which is very badly in need of reform. And it can also reduce a number of

0:08:59.090,0:09:02.510 people in the Lords, because one of the troubles about the Lords is it's much

0:09:02.510,0:09:06.980 too big, and so many debates, where you always have a right to speak

0:09:06.980,0:09:10.640 if you put your name down, certainly the debates on enormously

0:09:10.640,0:09:15.980 important subjects, where you have a rule or a very strong recommendation not

0:09:15.980,0:09:19.730 to speak for more than four or five minutes. (EP) Let's think about what the

0:09:19.730,0:09:24.230 British people might think about the abolition of the bishops. According to a

0:09:24.230,0:09:28.360 YouGov survey in 2017, which was conducted for The Times, 0:09:28.360,0:09:33.420 62% of British people think that no religious clerics should have

"an automatic rights to seats" in the
House of Lords. if that's broadly accurate.

0:09:39.640,0:09:44.080 is that enough support for constitutional change, 62% of the British people?

0:09:44.080,0:09:46.730 (DT) I think that's certainly a good reason for constitutional [change].

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I think it's only about 8% who are positively in favour of the continuation

0:09:52.070,0:09:58.460 of the bishops rights to sit in the Lords. But the Lords, I think, does play

0:09:58.460,0:10:03.980 quite a useful role at present, as a revising chamber. But the fact that

0:10:03.980,0:10:09.310 there's no democratic justification for it, reduces public respect for the Lords.

0:10:09.310,0:10:15.320 They would like to see a more democratic constitution, so it would certainly be a

0:10:15.320,0:10:22.070 step forward in reform of the House of Lords, only one step forward because it

0:10:22.070,0:10:26.720 needs absolutely radical reform, in my view. But there's always this talk about

0:10:26.720,0:10:32.810
'can we have an elected second chamber?'
Well, yes. I think we should have an

0:10:32.810,0:10:36.320 elected second chamber, but not as a rival to the House of Commons. It should

0:10:36.320.0:10:43.010

be part of a much larger constitutional change. (EP)That's very interesting, Dick.

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Thinking about the House of Lords as a body which represents perhaps different

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aspects of British society, another alternative which is often mooted to

0:10:51.980,0:10:56.350 getting rid of the bishops, is instead to increase the number of

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clerics in the Lords but to broaden their criteria so that representatives

of all different religions and Church of England denominations within the UK are represented.

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Isn't this proposal worth considering? (DT) No. It would be even worse

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than the present system we've got we want to stop this mix of religion and

politics, where it's inexorably mixed. Look at Suni and Shias which have torn

apart the Middle East.

Look what's happening in Turkey.

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At the moment there's an unfortunate trend in the world for those countries

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which did not have a theocratic constitution to move that way.

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Malaysia is a good example of a country which was Muslim

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but moving more and more towards democracy. Now it's rather reversing its

trend because of the greater pressure towards having a theocratic state.

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Indonesia is going the same way the largest Muslim country in the world.

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The last thing you want is to have more religion in mixed with politics.

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We should get it right out of politics.

(EP) Some people have said

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on that point, that you could also have a group of representatives of

non-religious people, maybe the Humanists, or

atheist representatives. What would you say that?

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(DT) Again, do you really want to have all these different attitudes

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represent as of right? If that's

what people want to elect, fair enough.

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If people do want to, ifthere are some

bishops who make a major

contribution, I could think of one, for example the former bishop of Oxford,

Richard Harries, makes very useful

contributions. He sits the Lords now as an

0:12:47.920,0:12:53.830 people wanted of course, we could have an appointed House of Lords, and I

0:12:53.830,0:12:58.480 think that we should move to the big constitutional change towards an elected

0:12:58.480,0:13:04.090 representative House of Lords. (EP) So how might that work, to have such constitutional change, of

0:13:04.090,0:13:08.230 course it so it would be a huge, dramatic... (DT)Well it would be so dramatic that it's

0:13:08.230,0:13:13.269 not going to happen, certainly in my lifetime. But we now have an increasingly

0:13:13.269,0:13:18.129 assertive Scottish Parliament move towards a complete break up of the United

0:13:18.129,0:13:25.589 Kingdom. We have a Northern Irish parliament, Stormont. We have a Welsh Parliament.

0:13:25.589,0:13:32.290 We have a certain amount of of quite influential mayors now, like the mayor

0:13:32.290,0:13:38.470 for example for Birmingham and the wider area. We have got an opportunity at

0:13:38.470,0:13:42.459 this moment, when there's so much talk about for a more federal Britain. We're

0:13:42.459,0:13:47.560 far too centralized as a nation. It's a great disadvantage,

0:13:47.560,0:13:51.580 this concentration on London. (EP)Why is it a disadvantage?

0:13:51.580,0:13:57.560 (DT) Well, it's because you get all the powers concentrate in London and neglect of

0:13:57.569,0:14:02.079 certain areas of the country which feel neglected.

But if you had a federal Britain and you had not only a Scottish and a Welsh and

0:14:08.050,0:14:14.560 Northern Irish parliament, but you had one for the Northeast and the northwest

0:14:14.560,0:14:19.899 and the Southwest and London and the South East. You could have a constitution

0:14:19.899,0:14:24.339 which is really rather like the German constitution, which works extremely well,

0:14:24.339,0:14:29.019 where they have the bundesrat, of the different länder, which first of all have

0:14:29.019,0:14:33.040 considerable amount of powers, which had devolved from the centre, and then they

0:14:33.040,0:14:40.089 are represented in the upper house, the bundesrat, and their elected

0:14:40.089,0:14:45.130 representatives from the elected länder, in this case it would be from the different

0:14:45.130,0:14:50.170 regions, or countries, or whatever you like to call it. The elected

0:14:50.170,0:14:54.220 representatives would then be there in

the House of Lords elected by the

0:14:54.220,0:14:57.819 different regions then we'd have a constitution which people could accept

0:14:57.819,0:15:01.870 because it was democratic, and it would also have a state which should function

0:15:01.870,0:15:06.220 much better because it was more decentralized.
(EP) What about the monarch's

0:15:06.220,0:15:08.910 role as the head of the Church of England? Wouldn't it be necessary for

0:15:08.910,0:15:12.800 constitutional reform for the Church of England to be disestablished?

0:15:12.800,0:15:19.819 (DT) Oh, I think so. Certainly. Oh yes. It's a nonsense to have this historic role

0:15:19.819,0:15:24.499 for the head of the Church of England heading back to the great times when it

0:15:24.499,0:15:28.119 was Catholic or Protestant,

0:15:28.119,0:15:33.529 democratic or non democratic. At least we've got away from that.

This division between church and state is not

0:15:41.179,0:15:48.019 complete, but it isn't as if the presence of the bishops in the

0:15:48.019,0:15:54.470 House of Lords has made us an autocracy. But their influence, on

0:15:54.470,0:15:59.180 the whole, is not something which would make us a more effective democracy.

(EP) And a final question: judging by the mood in

Parliament at the moment, and you've already

0:16:03.860,0:16:08.680 touched on this, would it be fair to say that the odds of getting this bill passed are against

0:16:08.680,0:16:12.340 (DT) Oh, the odds are very much against, I'm sorry to say.

0:16:12.349,0:16:19.329 But we are very bad, as I said at the beginning, at constitutional reform.

Time after time people have tried to have some slightly half-baked attempts

0:16:24.199,0:16:31.069 at reforming the House of Lords. They've all failed. What we really need is a

0:16:31.069,0:16:35.089 constitutional commission to look at the way in which Britain can be a more

0:16:35.089,0:16:39.949 effective, decentralized federal state. (EP) I suppose that the last time we really

0:16:39.949,0:16:44.520 tried to have a constitutional revolution in this country was in the 1640's...

0:16:44.520,0:16:52.320 or maybe 1689 perhaps. (DT) Quite. The Glorious Revolution of

0:16:52.329,0:16:58.909 1688, wasn't it, was one case of reform. Yes, there have been a number of very

0:16:58.909,0:17:03.529 important steps of reform. The Victorian age was quite a step, The Great Reform bill,

0:17:03.529,0:17:08.539 and then the later extensions of the franchise. But very slow, we were

0:17:08.539,0:17:12.259 very backwards in some ways, compared with other countries. Development in
