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Josephine, first of all could you tell us about your recent work for the National

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Secular society at the United Nations?

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(Josephine Macintosh, JM) Hi

Emma. So, for my recent work, so, I was

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representing the NSS at the 43rd Human Rights Council at the UN in Geneva and

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in particular we had submitted written statements and I was there to deliver

some oral statements on three main topics and the first was on male

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circumcision - essentially non-therapeutic genital cutting of boys. This ended up

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not being an oral statement but we just had the written statement due to some

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admin issues and then we also, I also delivered a statement on caste

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discrimination in the UK, which was I think the third time that we were

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addressing the council on that topic and then finally I delivered a statement

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from the Roman Catholic Church.

(EP) Okay great. Thank You Josephine. And

just,

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just be clear, which um council? was

it the UN General Council? (JM) It's

0:02:04.820,0:02:08.679 the Human Rights Council and the Human Rights Council is a meeting of

0:02:08.679,0:02:15.879 a certain number of states and also of civil society who meet three times a year for

0:02:15.879,0:02:21.340 three weeks and they, during that time, go through a whole agenda of various human

0:02:21.340,0:02:25.959 rights topics and there is also, in parallel to that, a

0:02:25.959,0:02:30.430 Universal Periodic Review which is what we talked about, which is what we, we use

0:02:30.430,0:02:35.620 to address clerical child abuse in Italy on, under and that is essentially a

0:02:35.620,0:02:40.450 review of human rights concerns in various countries and so every country

0:02:40.450,0:02:45.480 goes through this voluntary process of having their human rights situation

0:02:45.480,0:02:51.940 assessed essentially by a UN body and then there is also contributions that can

0:02:51.940,0:02:57.400 be made from both states and also from civil society - so from NGOs, of which the

0:02:57.400,0:03:01.239 NSS is one. (EP) So Josephine, why is it important do you think for the National

0:03:01.239,0:03:06.010 Secular Society to be represented at the UN? (JM) I think it's really important for us

as an essentially non-governmental organization to be able to ensure that

0:03:10.540,0:03:15.099 the secular principles and values that we're trying to promote within the UK

0:03:26.139,0:03:32.319 it also allows us to put pressure domestically in the UK by showing

0:03:42.040,0:03:48.669 United Nations and beyond that, we're able to point to ways in which secularist

0:03:48.669,0:03:55.090 principles are also not being upheld in other countries. Obviously the NSS is a,

0:03:55.090,0:04:01.479 is a national organization but I think we still have an important understanding

0:04:01.479,0:04:06.370 of secularist principles and an ability essentially to be able to check

0:04:06.370,0:04:12.459 them and to bring them to bear when on an international stage, so that is one of

0:04:12.459,0:04:17.100 the reasons. (EP) How did you become involved in this work for the NSS at the UN? 0:04:17.100,0:04:25.300

(JM) Um, so as I said I was, I started off as an intern.

I was suggested to Roy Brown by Anthony

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Grayling - A.C. Grayling who's a philosopher who'd come to speak at my university and

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he suggested given that I had an interest in these kinds of issues and

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human rights and he suggested that I get in touch with Roy Brown who was somebody

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who was heading a lot of the initiatives at the UN for various NGOs, ranging from

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humanist NGOs to the National Secular society but also Center for Inquiry

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which is an American NGO, and so I started off as an intern and started

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working for various NGOs under sort of Roy Brown's organization at the, in

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Geneva and then from there became permanent representative for some of

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these NGOs as well which meant returning during my holidays to Geneva and also

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having grown up in Switzerland, so having had that physical link to, to the country

my parents. (EP) How much support is there for secularist principles in the UN

is support but support from, from some states but the difficulty often

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comes from who is in power in those states so we have had in the past

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discussions with representatives from, from the UK delegation - I'd given a

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speech for example on Saudi Arabia which was them essentially interrupted by the

Saudi ambassador representative and the Ireland I think it was, the UK, the US,

France all of these representatives from these countries spoke up and said

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well you've got to let this person speak and so there, there's been some, some

from some delegations. I mean, also I have to say, that I haven't, I attended the Human

Rights Council this time around which was cut short by the corona virus

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but I haven't attended for a few years before that, for essentially three years,

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due to being working full-time in London but especially when I was very active

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between 2012 and 2016, there was a lot of push-back from countries that were belong,

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that belong to what was, what is called the OIC which is the, I think it stands

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for the Organization of Islamic

Conference or something like that so

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essentially it's a group of Islamic countries and also from Russia and these,

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these delegations were essentially pushing for what they termed traditional

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values, which often looked to promote family - so-called family values which

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often goes against secularist principles which will promote religious

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there's been some difficulty because there a lot of fault lines are

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being created within the Human Rights Council along, by it, by sort of alliances

let's take some specific examples on

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that point, so you mentioned one of the issues you were speaking about in

the forty-third conference was male circumcision. What were your, first of all,

that has been made for female genital mutilation however there's not much

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consideration being given also to male circumcision and traditional, what may be

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seen as cultural values, often trump the rights of the child in circumstances

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where as a baby or sometimes a bit older, they might then have to undergo a form

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of genital cutting

and that genital cutting does not have

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therapeutic reasons for, as to why it is needed and it can cause quite a

lot of difficulties for the child in later life but because this is

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a very accepted cultural practice globally, we've had people provide input

0:09:38.930,0:09:44.810 specific issues. So, for example, we would then be lobbying the repetiteur for the

0:10:23.120,0:10:29.900 process, so what stage are you at now with the submissions for the NSS? (JM) So

of abuse especially if that abuse has

0:10:55.370,0:11:00.800 come from members of, of religious organizations and in particular the

0:11:00.800,0:11:05.810 Roman Catholic Church in the case of the Italy Universal Periodic Review because

0:11:05.810,0:11:09.890 the Catholic Church has such a privileged position within society and

0:11:09.890,0:11:14.300 also legally in Italy. (EP) Well what's been the Italian government's response so far?

0:11:14.300,0:11:18.770 (JM) We haven't had any direct, as far as I know, any direct response from the

0:11:18.770,0:11:23.990 Italian government and so this is the issue sometimes with putting, making

0:11:23.990,0:11:29.060 these statements at the UN level - I've often I think gotten feedback from other

0:11:29.060,0:11:32.360 NGOs and from people who are specifically interested in these issues

0:11:32.360,0:11:37.340 but from the actual governments themselves they have a tendency to reply

0:11:37.340,0:11:42.770 and just say well, and not directly to the NSS statements, but just to civil

address them so we would, we hope that it will at least interest some people

0:12:33.140,0:12:37.090 that is published - what we had been urging is for that report to have,

0:12:37.090,0:12:44.030 to include the need for what we're calling for - mandatory reporting -

0:12:44.030,0:12:47.660 essentially the idea is that if you're a position of responsibility and you hear

0:12:47.660,0:12:53.780 of or are aware of abuse of children going on or of a child you then have a legal

0:13:05.750,0:13:10.339 currently..... so our aim in a way is to sort of show

0:13:10.339,0:13:16.100 that there is a lot of gaps still in the protection around children. (EP) You mentioned

0:13:16.100,0:13:19.430 the possibility of linking up with other organizations - has that happened so far

0:13:19.430,0:13:24.410 on this issue? (JM) On child abuse, I think so -I know that Keith Porteous Wood, who's

0:13:24.410,0:13:29.629 the President of the NSS, has worked quite a lot with other organizations, so

0:13:29.629,0:13:34.220 for example, organizations for survivors of abuse - he's also worked very closely

0:13:34.220,0:13:42.680 with researchers in Australia who have created a, a compendium of, essentially an

0:13:42.680,0:13:48.399 analysis of child abuse both in Australia and abroad and who've provided

0:13:48.399,0:13:54.800 ways in which it can be addressed and so we've also worked with an organization

0:13:54.800,0:13:59.600 called Mandate Now which develops the mandatory reporting framework and made

0:13:59.600,0:14:07.000 sure that this, these kinds of organisations are also on the radar of

0:14:07.000,0:14:10.399 the people to whom were, for example, submitting written statements so whether

0:14:10.399,0:14:13.939 it's within the UN Human Rights framework or within the UN Committee of

0:14:13.939,0:14:18.100 the Rights, Committee on the Rights of the Child, we would then seek to

0:14:18.100,0:14:22.639 highlight what other organizations are doing because they will essentially be

0:14:22.639,0:14:28.670 the experts in these fields to help provide solutions or frameworks to be

0:14:28.670,0:14:32.389 able to address the issue. (EP) So it's a collective effort basically. (JM) Yes it is. Yes, yeah.

Council and what then happened with that is that we, I think it was Keith, was, so

0:15:09.379,0:15:15.620 the House of Lords in London and then put, and as they were putting in changes

0:15:15.620,0:15:20.149 to the Equality Act, to try to say well actually caste should be a protected

0:15:20.149,0:15:23.160 characteristic and so what's happened is that we

0:15:23.160,0:15:28.260 have been able to get that, be, so essentially make, ensure that it is considered

0:15:28.260,0:15:34.589 by members of the House of Lords as bills were being tabled. However, so just to

0:15:39.779,0:15:43.770 UN and it's being raised at the UN also puts pressure on Parliament and on

0:15:43.770,0:15:47.399 members of the House of Lords and on politicians within the UK because the UN

0:15:47.399,0:15:53.880 obviously has, has clout and has, and is relevant to the way that the UK wants to

0:17:01.470,0:17:06.059 sociologists who might be carrying out a qualitative or even quantitative

an impact on a huge variety of, of areas of society so for example it had impacts

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be caste discrimination when people seek employment.

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There is also issues around care, elderly care, so if you are

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for example from a lower caste or so-called lower caste you might not then

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get the right kind of elderly care from providers who would give caste some

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kind of regard, so there is essentially a huge variety and that, that's sort of

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from, from a societal perspective these are examples that treat with, with sort of

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organized parts of society but there is also a huge untold impact when it comes

than by legislation. (EP) Is that adequate or inadequate in your view? (JM) No, which is

caste discrimination. Instead, case law would only develop if somebody brings a

case that is then successful and that then sets a precedent that says that

0:24:16.120,0:24:22.270 likely, how is it going to affect it do you think in the near future? (JM) So we, the

0:24:22.270,0:24:26.920 Human Rights Council in, this time round was running between February and March and

0:24:26.920,0:24:31.780 actually the first two weeks went ahead and the last week was cancelled. I was

0:24:31.780,0:24:37.060 quite surprised that it even went ahead because at the time the Swiss government

0:24:37.060,0:24:43.330 had said that gatherings of a thousand people should not be taking place and
